And again, we will not all be able to be present. We remain spatially divided communities, even though we understand ourselves to be united in Christ.

In some ways this past year has felt like a very long Lent, through which we have had an imposed fast from so much that keeps us alive spiritually in more usual times. Gradually we are emerging from this restricted and disciplined time into a new season. Finally we can say (although not yet sing together!) alleluia!

In the Easter stories in the Bible, many of which we will begin to hear again from this Sunday, those that had followed Jesus for some time were surprised where and how they encountered the risen Lord. My prayer for us all is that we will be expectant, ready to meet with Jesus wherever we encounter him, ready to follow him from the garden of resurrection to re-engage with service and mission in our communities. Happy Easter!!

Safe on the Streets

We all have been affected in one way or another by the tragic death of Sarah Everard and women young and not so young are right to voice their concerns at a situation where individuals feel afraid to walk or be left alone on the street, in a park or anywhere else in the community.

Whilst thinking about the devastating effect on one family this is far from an isolated occurrence for in addition to the many women who are attacked there are the victims of knife crime and in particular the many young men seriously injured or killed which are a regular occurrence. Remember also the rough sleepers, the individuals with substance or mental health issues who are easy targets and regularly abused. It's so easy to say individuals should be cautious or we need more police on patrol to keep people and the streets safe but is this the answer? We may need more police officers or other protection but we may have also reached the time and stage for a culture change and an in-depth look at our community. It isn't good enough to leave it to others or say it's not my problem, we are community each one of us, me and you and it's our responsibility to create a society where women need not worry about walking alone, mothers know that their son or daughter will come home, walking past a group of people does not make you afraid, someone on a park bench or in a doorway will not be attacked, a substance user or eccentric is safe.

Is this too much to ask or a dream world? It's up to us.

Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, Easter

On **Maundy Thursday**, Thursday 1 April, the Rt Rev Andrew Swift, Bishop of Brechin will lead a Celebration of the Eucharist at 6.30pm. This will be followed by the Vigil which begins at 7pm and lasts until Midnight. On the hour, and on the half hour there will be a reading from scripture, finishing with the Gospel of the Watch at Midnight. The Vigil will be live streamed and will take place in a Zoom meeting. Those who wish to participate in the vigil are welcome to come and go from the Zoom meeting as they please. The Zoom details for the vigil will be published here in advance of the service.

On **Good Friday**, 2 April, the Rt Rev Anne Dyer, Bishop of Aberdeen & Orkney will lead reflections on the Stations of the Cross from 12 noon. At 2.30pm the passion narrative and Good Friday liturgy will be broadcast from a recording made in 2020. Between 2-3pm all who wish to are asked to find a cross in their own home, and to sit with the cross in reflection. These services will be broadcast via Youtube and Facebook.

On **Easter Sunday** there will be a Celebration of the Eucharist at the normal time of 11am. This service will be led by the Most Rev Mark Strange, Primus of the Scottish Episcopal Church and will feature the Scottish Episcopal Virtual Choir. This service will be broadcast via Youtube and Facebook.

'Children's Chapel' is available on-line from early Sunday morning every week.
