## Matthew 11.7-9

<sup>7</sup> As they went away, Jesus began to speak to the crowds about John: 'What did you go out into the wilderness to look at? A reed shaken by the wind? <sup>8</sup> What then did you go out to see? Someone<sup>[a]</sup> dressed in soft robes? Look, those who wear soft robes are in royal palaces. <sup>9</sup>What then did you go out to see? A prophet?<sup>[b]</sup> Yes, I tell you, and more than a prophet.

## To reflect:

Jesus asked the crowds, what then did you go out to see? In the same vein, I ask, what do you see in this image for our reflection today? I see a pregnant Virgin Mary. I see a patient Mary. There is no greater patience than that of Mary who waited patiently for nine solid months and navigated through the changes and chances of pregnancy (some good and some bad) to give birth to baby Jesus, and behold the Saviour of the world, whose kingdom is an everlasting kingdom, whose dominion endures throughout all generations, who is faithful in all his words, and gracious in all his deeds (Psalm 145.13). Patience has twin sisters and brothers such as waiting, calmness, self-control, perseverance, resilience and hope. Patience is a valuable virtue that can impact positively in the various aspects of our life and faith journey. The season of Advent calls us to wait and hope, and therein lies patience.
