## Antiphon for Epiphany

# Scripture: Psalm 72

Endow the king with your justice, O God, the royal son with your righteousness.

- <sup>2</sup> May he judge your people in righteousness, your afflicted ones with justice.
- <sup>3</sup>May the mountains bring prosperity to the people, the hills the fruit of righteousness.
- <sup>4</sup> May he defend the afflicted among the people and save the children of the needy; may he crush the oppressor.

- <sup>12</sup> For he will deliver the needy who cry out, the afflicted who have no one to help.
- <sup>13</sup> He will take pity on the weak and the needy and save the needy from death.
- <sup>14</sup>He will rescue them from oppression and violence, for precious is their blood in his sight.

## To reflect

One definition of epiphany in the Cambridge English Dictionary is, "a moment when you suddenly feel that you understand or suddenly become conscious of something."

I have always thought of Epiphany as the coming of the Kings , the recognition of the kingship of Jesus as portrayed in Nativity plays almost everywhere. But, of course, Matthew does not mention royalty, but wisdom and the picture above represents this.

My moment of epiphany came when I realised how much more was packed into this story and how pertinent it is for today. Jesus was born in uncertain times of occupation by a foreign country with different rules and religion. He brought the Good News to all including those on the edge of society with the instruction to love others regardless of race or creed. In our uncertain present time we need the injunction to love each other, even our enemies, with mercy, pity, peace and Love.
