

CONTEMPLATIVE ACTS - LITANY

A Litany is an intercessory prayer, with responses by a group or congregation. It is a series of petitions, with common repeating responses. They are used in services, processions and feature in Ash Wednesday. They have been used since the fifth century, originating in Rome with the first English language rite prepared by Thomas Cranmer being a litany.

Litanies can be used as prayers for help, praise, forgiveness, thanksgiving or blessing. They can be said or sung. You can find other litanies online, in the American Episcopal Church Book of Common Prayer there is a Great Litany. There are litanies in the Scottish Prayer Book.

Below are the litany for Ash Wednesday and the litany for Ordinations. You'll notice that each litany there are common responses with different petitions, but each start with similar words. The litanies begin with the Trinitarian God and end with acclaiming that God is holy, strong, immortal and wise.

You're invited to pray a litany – either on your own or in a group. Perhaps you might want to incorporate a litany into your own daily prayer practice. Litanies can be adapted so you may wish to adapt a litany to include your concerns and requests using the beginning and ending and the responses 'have mercy on us'. 'good Lord deliver us', 'Hear us, good Lord'

Collect for First Sunday of Lent

Almighty God, whose Son fasted forty days in the wilderness. and was tempted as we are but did not sin, give us grace to discipline ourselves in submission to your Spirit, that as you know our weakness so we may know your power to save; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God. now and for ever. Amen.

Penitential Litany from Ash Wednesday Liturgy

God the Father, have mercy on us.

God the Son, have mercy on us.

God the Holy Spirit, have mercy on us.

Holy, blessed, and glorious Trinity, have mercy on us.

From all evil and mischief: from pride, vanity, and hypocrisy: from envy, hatred, and malice: and from all evil intent.

Good Lord, deliver us.

From sloth, worldliness, and love of money: from hardness of heart and contempt for your word and your laws,

From sins of body and mind: from the deceits of the world, the flesh, and the devil; from error and false doctrine,

In all times of sorrow, in all times of joy: in the hour of death, and at the day of judgement,

Good Lord, deliver us.

Govern and direct your holy Church: fill it with love and truth: and grant it that unity which is your will.

Hear us, good Lord.

Give us boldness to preach the gospel in all the world, and to make disciples of all the nations.

Hear us, good Lord.

Enlighten your ministers with knowledge and understanding, that by their teaching and their lives they may proclaim your word. **Hear us, good Lord.**

Give your people grace to hear and receive your word, and to bring forth the fruit of the Spirit.

Hear us, good Lord.

Bring into the way of truth all who have erred and are deceived.

Hear us, good Lord.

Strengthen those who stand: comfort and help the faint-hearted: raise up the fallen; and finally beat down Satan under our feet. **Hear us, good Lord.**
