MONDAY 25 MARCH



Monday of Holy Week

Isaiah 42.1-9, Psalm 36.5-11, Hebrews 9.11-15, 70hn 12.1-11

John 12:1-11

Six days before the Passover Jesus came to Bethany, the home of Lazarus, whom he had raised from the dead. There they gave a dinner for him. Martha served, and Lazarus was one of those at the table with him. Mary took a pound of costly perfume made of pure nard, anointed Jesus' feet, and wiped them with her hair. The house was filled with the fragrance of the perfume. But Iudas Iscariot, one of his disciples (the one who was about to betray him), said, "Why was this perfume not sold for three hundred denarii and the money given to the poor?" (He said this not because he cared about the poor, but because he was a thief: he kept the common purse and used to steal what was put into it.) Jesus said, "Leave her alone. She bought it so that she might keep it for the day of my burial. You always have the poor with you, but you do not always have me." When the great crowd of the Jews learned that he was there, they came not only because of Jesus but also to see Lazarus, whom he had raised from the dead. So the chief priests planned to put Lazarus to death as well, since it was on account of him that many of the Jews were deserting and were believing in Jesus.

Collect for Monday of Holy Week

Almighty God, whose Son was crucified yet entered into glory, may we, walking in the way of the cross, find it to be for us the way of life; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

Gospel Reflection

In today's Gospel Jesus is eating with Lazurus (who he raised from the dead), Mary and Martha. In an act of devotion Mary anoints Jesus feet with very expensive perfume. This honours who Jesus is, but also points to his death and the anointing of the dead and links to the gifts of the Magi to the infant Jesus. It appears that of all those Mary might be the only one who understands who Jesus really is and what is about to happen. There is dispute by those present about the best use of the expensive perfume, should it be used in an act of devotion or sold and the proceeds used for to benefit the poor? Different reasons for this attitude are explored in the different disciples, including Judas. What do you think was the best use for the perfume? How would you have reacted if you were present?
